A Meadowwink is a kind of bird — and it is also the word that is flying 12-year-old Devoru Klionsky to the Scripps National Spelling Reclater this month.

Klionsky is a 7th grader at Akiba Schechter Jewish Day School, 5235 S. Cornell Ave., and will be heading to Washington on May 31 to compete against students from across the nation. She climbed her way up from last year's defeat at the regional competition and has also had wins in the Chidon HaTanach (Bible Contest) and Akiba's annual book contest — where she read 11,000 pages.

The preliminary round will take place at 12:15 p.m. (central) June 3 on ESPN3, the semifinal will take place at 9 a.m. (central) June 4 on ESPN and the final will take place at 7 p.m. (central) June 4 on ABC.
